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TORRANCE SCHOOL TO BE BEAUTY SPOT

NEW LAWN WILL SOON PRESENT AN ATTRACTIVE GREEN FRONT

The people of Torrance will be glad to know that at last the new lawn in front of the school building is going to be a reality. Those directly interested in the school have worked for a long time to get this completed. Today the contractor for the sprinkling system broke ground and in a few days the agricultural department will have the fertilizer and seed here to begin planting. It is quite late in the season to start a lawn but with the modern sprinkler which they are installing, the lawn can be kept in perfect condition. By the end of the summer, with the new building completed and the new lawn in, it will be a place to which the whole city can point with pride.

GO AS DELEGATES TO STATE MEET

ATTEND STATE CONVENTION OF MODERN WOODMEN OF AMERICA

John H. Fess, accompanied by P. F. Brown and C. A. Benzel, returned Saturday afternoon from a week's trip to the State Convention of the Modern Woodmen of America held in Santa Cruz last week. They left Torrance the Sunday before, joined a large delegation in Los Angeles, motoring to Santa Barbara the first day. A dinner was prepared for them there and one hundred were banqueted. Their next stop was Paso Robles, where they stopped for the night. They were subsequently taken to the ball park, preceded by the Paso Robles band and a parade. They witnessed a ball game, the first ball being pitched by Padereski, first premier of Poland. Moving pictures were taken of the delegation here before they left on their last lap for Santa Cruz. Upon arrival at the convention city a grand ball was tendered the guests. The following day a competitive drill was staged between the different Woodmen teams of the uniform rank. P. F. Brown and C. A. Benzel wore the uniform of the Long Beach team, which won the honors of the day and carried home the banner. The Torrance contingent left Santa Cruz for San Jose and the big red-wood districts Friday, thence south to Tehachapi, where they visited for several hours on the fruit ranch of Mr. Fess. They arrived in Torrance Saturday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock, the longest drive of any one day being 270 miles in ten hours. The national convention of the Modern Woodmen of America will be held in St. Louis in June, and delegates were elected at this convention for this event. Mr. Fess states that the country upstate is very beautiful and prosperous at this time of the year, and that his fruit ranch is doing nicely.
