

EX-RESIDENT OF TORRANCE IS NEARLY KILLED BY THUGS

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Paige of Torrance were shocked Sunday upon returning from church services to learn that their brother, Edward E. Trefry, of San Pedro, had been brutally assaulted about noon that day in the store of Paige & Trefry on Sixth street.

It seems that Mr. Trefry was just closing up after a brief opening of his store in order to serve certain customers depending on him for milk and cream. Two men in sailors' uniforms entered, asking for cake and milk, which they consumed there. They both were observed and noted by two ladies.

The men went out after socially chatting with Mr. Trefry and a moment later returned, asking for another bottle of milk. No one else was in the store this time. When Mr. Trefry went back to the refrigerator and stooped over to get the milk for them he was struck over the head and felled to the floor by what was supposed at first to have been a milk bottle, since one or two were found around him broken, but which later was proved to have been a piece of heavy automobile spring 18 inches long and used in the store for opening cases. Upon this steel, found by an officer of the Idaho after the excitement was all over, was found blood spots and hair, mute evidence entirely overlooked by the two detectives detailed to the case.

Mr. Trefry was rushed to the Emergency Hospital, where, two deep lacerations of the scalp requiring ten stitches to close, and a ugly bruise at base of the brain, were treated.

The fact that Mr. Trefry shouted for help just before the second blow was dealt probably saved him, the fiends evidently reckoning they

could loot the register and escape through the back room. But they found no egress there and became panic stricken. They left most of the cash and tried to walk out calmly, their victim being unconscious. But passersby had heard the cry and were searching the cause. Two men were seen fleeing up Mesa street and down Fifth, and the ladies and men who saw them are confident they can identify them if given an opportunity.

There are many residents of Torrance who will recall that Mr. Trefry lived here for a short time a couple of years ago, and will remember meeting him in his brother's store.

On Monday, May 5th, the Los Angeles Express published on its front page the following article on the HIGH COST OF MILK:

"Los Angeles is paying at the rate of \$5,760,000 more a year for the same quantity of milk that San Francisco is paying.

"There is only one-fourth of 1 per cent difference in butterfat content in the two cities, but there is a difference of 25 per cent in the price of the milk.

"In San Francisco the requirement is 3.75 per cent butterfat; in Los Angeles the requirement is 4 per cent. In this city the price of single quarts is 16 cents; in San Francisco, in cases, the price is only 12 cents a quart.

"The cost of feed in San Francisco averages the same as it does in Los Angeles; the cost of labor is as high, or higher, in the northern city. The cost of delivery is practically the same."
