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JIG MERCANTILE DEAL
TAKES PLACE HERESAM SEELIG NOW OWNER OF
RENN'S GROCERY; 15-YEAR
LEASE GIVEN ON STORE

As evidence of their faith in the future of Lomita, Sam Seelig, owner of a chain of groceries, meat markets and bakery stores combined, purchased the business of W. A. Renn on Saturday. A fifteen-year lease was given by Mr. Renn to his successor, the former Lomita merchant to retire permanently from active business life, according to his statement today.

The change of management will take place on June 1, when the name "Sam Seelig, Cash Is King," will replace that of "Renn's." It is understood that the new concern will open a market in their new store and install an electric oven for their bakery department. This policy is followed in all the Seelig stores, and Lomita will be no exception along this line, according to unofficial information given the "News Letter."

The very fact that a business firm of the reputation of Sam Seelig, with his wonderful buying power and extensive system of distribution of the staples of life, has decided to locate in Lomita carries with it a tremendous impetus for the welfare of this growing community. The field was thoroughly investigated by the Seelig interests for the past two months. A. I. Stewart, general superintendent, having made five or six trips to Lomita, going over conditions here before they decided to close the deal with Renn. Recently a large store was opened in San Pedro, and at the same time the Lomita deal was closed a similar transaction was contemplated for a lease in another city nearby.
