

Ex-So vies Men Promptly Halt Ex Troublemakers.

In response to the warning issued by their national commander, F. W. Gabraith, Jr., American Legion mem-bers in many parts of the country have been active in fighting against efforts of pro-Germans and other burbersuic response to the second hyphenated persons to drive a wedge between America and her allies in the World war.

Twenty-five thousand patriotic citi zens of New York attended, the "All American Meeting for God and Coun-try," which was held in Madison Square Garden under the auspices of the Legion, as a protest against a pre-vious pro-German meeting, said to be for the purpose of creating sentiment against the alleged "Horrors on the Rhine.


