C. F. FARQUHAR IS AWARDED BIG CONTRACT

C. F. Farquhar has been given the contract for building the new concrete reservoir which is to be used in taking care of Harbor City's water supply. It will be located on the hill southwest of town, and when completed will be connected up with the other units. The specifications call for a re-enforced concrete tank 34 x 120 feet over all, ten feet deep and will have a storage capacity of approximately 300,000 gallons of water. The tank is to be covered with a shingle roof and will be made as sanitary as possible. It is estimated that the new reservoir will hold enough water to supply the town from three to four days under most any condition. Mr. Farquhar will put a force of men on the job at once and the work is to be rushed to completion as rapidly as possible. Harbor City Sun.

TEACHERS' SALARIES RAISED

There was general rejoicing recently among the teachers in the Los Angeles public schools following announcement by the Board of Education that there will be a general salary increase in the budget for 1921-22. The increases were decided upon after several weeks of conferences among members of the board. They will aggregate \$613,850 and the salary schedule during the coming school year will total \$9,315,125.

Elementary school teachers will receive approximately \$30 more each month than at present; high school principals \$40, and vice-principals \$20. The new salary schedule provides for increases each successive year. In some cases these will extend over a period of three years and in others as long as ten years, the maximum salaries to be paid at the ends of these periods.

Teachers in primary and elementary grades will receive \$140 a month for the first year. There will be a gradual increase until the tenth year, when they will receive \$200 a month. Kindergarten teachers' salaries will range from \$140 for the first year to \$200 for the tenth year, while directors will receive \$125 for the first year and \$150 the sixth year. Assistants will be paid \$100 the first year and \$120 the fifth year.

Principals in the primary and grammar grades will receive \$215

for one-room schools; two to five-room schools, \$220 to \$228 the fifth year; six to ten rooms, \$230 the first year to \$255 the sixth year; 11 to 17 rooms, \$260 first year to \$280 the sixth year; 18 rooms and over, \$296 first year to \$330 for the sixth year. Special and development school teachers will receive \$230 the first year and \$240 the third year where attendance is less than 60; over that attendance the salary will be \$260. Supervisors of subjects will receive \$320; assistants, \$275; acting assistants, \$233. Evening school principals will receive \$90; teachers, \$60; playground and supplemental classes, teachers, \$54.

Intermediate and high school and library teachers will receive \$180 the first year and \$260 the tenth year; high school sub-heads of departments, \$265; high school heads of departments, \$265 for the first year and \$300 the sixth year; high school registrars, \$285; supervisors of subjects in high schools, \$340; assistants, \$275; evening high school principals, \$110; vice-principals, \$90; teachers, \$90; special evening high school teachers, four hours a day, \$180; playground teachers, \$54.

High or high and intermediate principals' salaries follow: Franklin, \$400; Gardena, \$380; Hollywood, \$450; Lincoln, \$420; Los Angeles, \$450; Manual Arts, \$450; Owensmouth, \$320; Polytechnic, \$450; San Fernando, \$380; San Pedro, \$390; Van Nuys, \$380; Wilmington, \$180; Lomita, \$170; Torrance, \$170; Berendo, Boyle Heights, Central, Lafayette, McKinley, Slauson, Thirtieth street and Virgil, each \$390.

GIVE CHICKS SKIMMED MILK

Considered Desirable for Youngsters During First Week, According to Specialists.

Skimmed milk is considered by specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture very desirable for chicks during the first week. In order to insure that all chicks get the milk it is advisable to dip the chick's beak in milk before it gets any other food. (This can best be done when removing chicks from the incubator.) Give milk to drink as long as it is advisable.

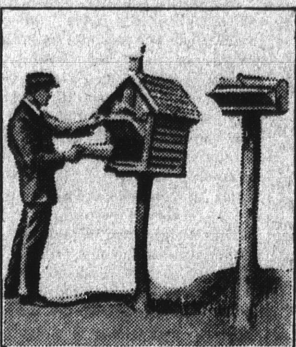
IMPROVE LOOK OF MAILBOX

One of the Best of Schemes is to Give It the Appearance of a Birdhouse.

The usual R. F. D. mailbox is a simple affair of tin and wood—efficient but ugly. It stands out in front of the house and spoils the looks of the place.

What's the remedy for this? Build more stately boxes.

Here you see a mailbox that is made like a birdhouse. It is divided into two floors—the lower one for

The upper floor is lined with tin to protect the letters from a possibly leaky roof. COMMUNITY HAS NEW IDEA

Blanket Insurance Practically Covering Whole Town Is Said to Have Had Excellent Results.

All the workers employed by the various industries located at Kingsport, Tenn., have been insured against death, sickness and accident under a single group policy the New York Times records.

In all about two thousand persons employed by ten large concerns are thus protected and as the population of the town of Kingsport is estimated at about 10,000, almost every family in the community will receive a financial benefit in case of accident, sickness or death overtaking one of its bread winning members.

The policy has been in effect for some months. According to officials of the insurance company this is the first instance known where a whole community has adopted a standardized plan of insurance. The experiment is attracting the attention of many other municipalities, especially public officials who are interested in community service.

A prominent community worker has said that the prospective financial benefit to be derived by individuals under the policy was of far less importance than the general good which has resulted from the quickening of the conscience of the whole Kingsport community.

Garden Cities for London.

London is trying to work out its housing crisis by building little garden cities about twenty miles outside its limits. These experiments in wholesale home construction are being carried on by the enterprise of private capital backed up with the generous government subdivision that is being given to all home construction projects.

The profits of the promoting company will be limited to seven per cent of the investment, the proceeds over and above this amount going back into town improvements.

The ideal house, so much talked of in England, that resulted from the Daily Mail competition will be given a practical try-out in this new city. The name of the place when completed will be Welwyn Garden City.—New York Post.

Plant Vines on Indoor Lattice.

In altering old homes rather than in the construction of new ones, lattices and grills seem to appeal to the interior decorators' scheme of things. The same manner of treatment is given a too expansive bay window, where, instead of curtains, decorative jars holding climbing vines are placed at the sides. The vines will soon make the lattice a thing of beauty.

The use of the growing vines on the lattice indoors is growing in favor, the plainness of the walls of the breakfast room is relieved by the green of the climbing vines.

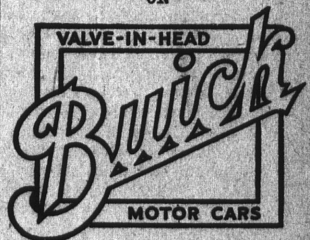
