

### When One Is Sixteen



SUMMER and youth and organdie go hand in hand through the gay summer days. They seem to belong together and customers are making the most of an ever-growing vogue for the spiritliest of fabrics. Organdie is employed in frocks and their trimmings, in millinery and in dress accessories for all womanhood from little girlhood on, but it appears that girls from sixteen to the end of their "teens" are favored with the most adorable of all the frocks made of it.

Simple styles and enchanting colors govern the designing of frocks for girls in their teens. The color range in organdie has been widened and includes the dark staple shades of blue and brown, the pale tones in many colors and all the new hues that have found favor this season, including ocean blue, tangerine, grape-fruit yellow, coral, cherry and lovely gray-greens. Colors are nearly always made up in combination with white. An example of this is shown in the pretty frock for a girl of sixteen to eighteen or more, which appears here. The dress of blue organdie has a straight full skirt banded about the hips with white organdie, its short sleeves are finished with a plaited frill of white and a very ample fichu is edged with a double frill or organdie and extended into a girlish that terminates in loops and sash-ends of organdie.

Besides this color-and-white combination, sweet sixteen rejoices in two-color combinations in dresses made for youthful revelries. Purple and yellow, pink and blue, red and tan, or whatever else the colorist, who is a master of his art, chooses to mix in just the right proportions, make up the gay party dresses of the pretty "sub-debs."

For the littler girls also, lively color combinations are used, with pockets, collars, sashes and organdie flowers, providing opportunities for the designers.
