On the subject of disarmament the action quoted below was taken recently by the Executive Commitof the California State Church Federation. It was ordered that a copy be forwarded to the President, the President of the Senate, the Secretary of State and to the Senators and Representatives in Contors and Representatives gress from California. This

for the construction and mainten-ance of great armaments crushes

the very people for whose protec-tion they are maintained; and "Whereas, it has been clearly demonstrated that such armaments not conductive to peace, much more inclined to foment and

"Therefore, resolved: believe it to be the duty of America to propose and, with proper safeguards, to enter into agreements with the other great powers of the world providing for a concerted re-duction of armaments, such reduc-tion to proceed until only so much equipment shall remain as is required for national and international police protection.

"Resolved: That we approve the proposal made by the Senate of the

United States that the President call a conference of representatives of Great Britain, Japan and the United States to consider the beginning of a program of reduction of armaments, and that we earnestly urge the House of Representatives to concur in this action."
