applies to the 18th Amendment, as well as all laws adopted by the constituted authority of the people.

We need a new attitude toward one another. Mob spirit rules too frequently. Race prejudice and class hatred ought not to exist in the United States. We need a new and more friendly attitude toward the church and religion. The church is the best friend of the family, of parents and of the children.

The evening subject was: Was Jesus a Social Reformer? It was shown that while Jesus did not speak against human slavery, yet the teaching of the Christian religion so softened the hearts of Christian masters toward their slaves that one of the events in the observance of Christmas and Easter was the emancipation of slaves. Many reforms in society have had their origin in the practical application of the Christian religion. So while Christ did not attack the government of Rome, His religion has wrought for religious and civil liberty through the centuries.
