The city attorney was instructed to investigate the matter of pro-ceeding to be instigated for the city to acquire title to the streets in Torrance. At present the city holds title to only two of three streets, and if the city intends do-ing any improving it will be neces-sary for them to hold title to the streets. The most important matter to come before the Board was that of the garbage ordinance. The eity attorney has drafted an ordinance regulating the disposal of garbage from the homes and business houses in the city. Under this ordinance every person residing in a home, apartment house or rooming house must provide a metal container of more than five gallons and less than sixteen gallons capacity, the sam-to have handles and a metal cover. The cans must be placed in the alley within five feet of the prop-erty line, and if there is no alley the can must be placed on the curb where it will be accessible to the collector on the days of collection. A regular schedule is to be main-tained and will be published later. Violations of this ordinance carry a fine not to exceed \$300.00 or three months in the city jail, or both. An Alien is one who was born in a foreign country (except only Porto Rico and Hawaiian Islands) and has not been naturalized in the United States. The possession of what is called "First Papers" does not constitute citizenship. All Male Aliens between the ages of 21 and 60

years of age must register.

All aliens who fail to register before August 1, 1921, will be subject to arrest and imprisonment.


