WANTED, A CIRCUS GOVERNMENT

WHO GETS THE CHAMPAGNE?

"That French grape growers and wine merchants are greatly disappointed at the slow increase of wine shipments to the United States since the war; that only 8,000 more bottles of champagne were shipped here during the first five months of this year than during the corresponding five some s last year.
