### AUTO TRIP

Spokane, Aug. 1, '21.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts, Lomita, Cal.

Dear Friends—The day we left Lomita—June 14—we did not see the sun until 4 p. m. at Santa Barbara, having passed through a light rain at Ventura. The weather continued cool until we reached Alameda, where we visited with my brother over Sunday. We found the highway finished, except over the Gaviota Pass and about twelve miles to the north, which is graded, but a little rough, but nothing to compare with what we have since passed over.

Monday we started north. After crossing the Sacramento over the Rodio Ferry we had real hot weather until we passed Reading and got into the higher ground. The road is mostly good, except the detours to Ashland. At that place we found a beautiful camp ground with sulphur, lithia and fresh water. The sulphur and lithia is piped in for a distance of four miles. The park is about three-quarters of a mile long, lying on both sides of the creek, and the city has spent \$75,000 on improvements, which add to the natural beauty. The auto camp is at the upper end, and can easily take care of a hundred autos. They surely make you feel at home there. The drive down the river is fine, passing through fruit and grain districts until you reach Medford and Grant's Pass. After you leave here you have mountains along until you reach Roseburg, which has a nice camp ground and looks to be a thrifty, clean city. They boast of roses and fruit and are a live, up-to-date people. From Roseburg north to Portland you have a graded road all the way, except short detours, and where no paved it is covered with coars gravel. The driving is not so bad until you have to turn out to pass a machine. Then you have to drive very careful or skid. We camped at Eugene in the city's camp, where we found green grass, good water free wood and no flies or mosquitos. A beautiful city and a prosperous country around. The drive down the Willamette is grand. Gravel and fruit looks good, but one thing a Californian could not help notice was the numerous farms for sale. A man who did not live there said this always happens when a good crop is on. We also camped at Oregon city, the paper mill town. They claim to make 600 tons daily of print paper when running at full capacity. The camp ground overlooks the city and river, has good water and plenty of shade.

Out of Portland we took the Columbia River highway, paved to Hood River. This is a beautiful drive, with the river on one side and mountains, flowers, evergreens and hardwood trees on the other; also a number of waterfalls to add to the grandeur of the picture.

From Hood River the road is under construction to the John Day River, and is rather rough going. From there to Pendleton the road is fair. From Pendleton you have rolling hills covered with waving grain until you get near Spokane, where the road is partly finished and all graded. After arriving at Spokane we have visited east into Idaho, also north into B. C., where we used to be in business. It is very depressing to see once thrifty camps that are not working at all. Many are wondering where the next winter's provisions are to come from. We are now in Spokane, and will visit in and around here until we start back to the only place we have seen we would care to call home—South Lomita.

We have had some 102 weather here and, oh, the dust! You simply cannot get out of it. At any place where there is traffic at all they also have dust storms that would make a Santa Ana storm blush, especially at Kettle Falls. This condition is brought about by half of the farming district in the Big Bend being summer fallowed and cultivated. When there is wind at all there surely is dust in the air. You can say to those realtors that if my judgment is not overdrawn they cannot go far astray by locating people at Lomita. As I look at it, that section has the greatest future of any district of a like size we have visited. Also tell Mr. Phillips that the Buick still delivers the goods.
