Thousands of people were interested in these freakish discoveries, representing petrified human feet, bones, teeth of monster animals, as well as huge jaw bones and other collections made by scientists at the pits.

BANK MOVES INTO ITS NEW BUILDING

BRICK BUILDING PRESENTS AN ATTRACTIVE APPEARANCE AND IS MODERN

Wednesday was moving day for the First National Bank, when they shifted their belongings from the Dominguez Land Corporation build-ing to their new home across the street from the Auditorium.

Bank officials are quite proud of their new quarters, and do not try to conceal their pleasure over being located in such excellent and pleasant banking quarters. The real pride will be experienced at a later date when the formal opening is announced and customers, friends and strangers will be welcomed and shown about the new building, which presents a completeness and the most modern conveniences known in bank buildings of this

One of the most interesting deone of the most interesting details is that of the large vault, which is 12 x 12 feet in the clear, with 13-in. reinforced concrete walls lined with steel; every square inch being charged with connections to the burglar alarm. The massive door is of the Diebold type and weighs 7000 pounds, being three inches thick and of solid nonburnable steel. This was purchased of the American Bank Protection Co. of Minneapolis, whose reputation is matched against the crack burglars, who have never yet prov-ed their master. Another storage vault of 6 x 12 feet joins the larger one, and here the bank's books will he kept, while in the larger com-partment the safe and safety deposit boxes will be stored.

As one steps inside the main en-rance the first impression is most pleasing when the five windows to alther side of the fixtures present a ommanding view of mahogany mported white marble finish well-appointed compartments for bank clerks. To the right is the adies' rest room and is elegantly urnished. Telephones are handy nd writing desks are conveniently set. To the left side directly in ront is a private consultation room and back of this will be found the lesks of James W. Post, president and G. W. Neill, vice-president and hier.
