BUSS LINE WILL APPLY FOR FRANCHISE IN HARBOR CITY

Harbor City people have been very patient in regard to transportation facilities, and we believe the Railroad Commission will grant a franchise as soon as the matter is presented to them. Petitions for a buss line would be freely signed by fully ninety per cent of our people.
