# **Thirty Acres Leased** After Well Comes In

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### SANTA FE OIL WELL FLOWS FIVE HUNDRED BARRELS PER DAY AND SEEMS **TO INCREASE**

The Santa Fe well just west of Torrance has finally come in and is now flowing without the aid of the pumps, which were used at first.

On Monday the pumps were put on and the well was producing about 400 barrels a day, and on Tuesday the well began to flow without the aid of the pumps, flowing about 500 barrels the first twenty-four hours. It is considered very probable that the flow will increase and the limits are unknown.

Work has already been started on the work of the new well, located east of the present one, and on the property of the Dominguez Land Corporation. The sawdust road has been put down, and the trucks will be able to get on the ground without danger of sinking.

The new well is to be located 200 feet north and east of the second turn on the road to Redondo.

It has been stated that the drilling and sinking of the wells for the Fulton, Standard Oil, Dutch Shell and the Union Oil Co. will be started within the next thirty days.

The Torrance Holding Company may lease their thirty acres to the Standard Oil Company.
