This important matter was discussed at length at the last Fourth District Chamber of Commerce meeting held in Moneta, when resolutions supporting Mr. Gourdier's suggestions were adopted. Mr. Moore left Torrance with a much clearer view of the situation after consulting with the local postmaster, and it is thought that his recommendation will be quite positive for the improvement and definite action on the part of postal authorities is confidently looked for by Mr. Gourdier.

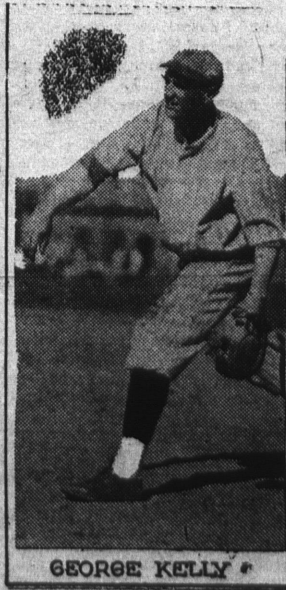
The regular meeting of the Royal Neighbors was held Wednesday evening at the Legion Hall. A large class was initiated at this meeting.
