## SUPERVISORS INVITE YOU

Gentlemen—Under instructions of the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County I extend to you an invitation to participate in the opening of the Malibu Road on Saturday, October 15, 1921.

The plans call for the formal opening of the road at 9 o'clock at Las Flores Canyon, being the easterly end of the Malibu Ranch, after which time the machines may proceed along the road, a distance of approximately twenty miles, to the Decker schoolhouse, where the settlers are giving a free barbecue to celebrate the opening of the road.

It is the purpose of the Board of Supervisors to establish a control upon the road, so that from 9 to 12 o'clock machines will only be permitted to go west on the road. Beginning at 2 o'clock, machines will be permitted to go east on said road.

This road is a graded dirt road and because of the large crowd which may be expected, the Board considers it necessary to take these safeguards in order to prevent accidents. It is expected 15,000 people will attend.

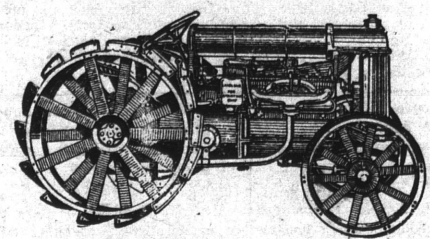
