Betterment of Water Service to be Discussed

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees was held Tuesday evening, October 18. Reports of the standing committees were on routine business only. The marshal reported that with a few tardy exceptions the license fees for the fourth quarter had been collected. It is pleasing to note that out-of-town firms and individuals doing business in the City of Torrance are paying their license fees without protest or exception. Several other municipalities have had more or less trouble in the past in the collection of license tax.

Several communications of public interest were read. A copy of a letter from the Pacific Electric Railway Co.'s chief engineer to the Torrance Water, Light and Power Co. gave several valuable suggestions as to the betterment of the water distributing system. This matter is to be discussed in the near future in a joint meeting to be held between the trustees of the city and officers of the Water Co. and the Land Co.

Another communication of particular interest was that from the Board of Supervisors, which was read, and which we believe is well worth quoting in part:

"The Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County has become increasingly aware of the fact that with the rapid expansion and growth of municipalities within the county there are arising problems that are of common concern to both the municipalities and the county. Most of these questions, it seems, have to do with physical matters, such as street layouts, acceptance of new subdivisions, sanitary drainage, water supply, zoning, etc." The letter continues with an invitation to meet in conference with representatives of other municipalities and the supervisors to discuss the advisability of forming a permanent regional planning conference. Chairman Proctor and City Engineer Postle were appointed representatives from Torrance to the first meeting to be held October 26. It is felt that if such a conference can be formed a great amount of good can be done in unifying the sentiments of different communities having common interests. The Fourth District Chamber of Commerce is doing good work along these lines, and will be glad to have such a body as this conference to carry their recommendations through to headquarters.

Ordinance No. 11, regulating the presenting, auditing and paying of demands upon city funds, was given.

TORRANCE SCHOOL NOTES

Nigger Slough Road Not Yet "Roughed Up"

The regular meeting of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce was held Monday evening in Legion Hall, with seven in attendance. While many might infer that the meeting was a "fizzle," yet just the opposite was the result. Many important questions that ought to interest everyone living in Torrance came up for discussion, and in many incidents action was started.

Mayor Proctor called attention to the slippery condition of the pavement over Nigger Slough and remembered the pre-election promises of Supervisor McClellan, who promised to have this part of the boulevard "roughed up" a year ago, and to date nothing had been done. As a result of this meeting Mr. McClellan's memory will be refreshed. W. T. Klusman recommended the posting of curve signs on two right-angle turns near Torrance, and the Auto Club officials have already been informed.

While discussing the dangerous condition of Nigger Slough on foggy nights or when light, drizzly rain is falling, it was stated that numerous wrecks happened on these slippery sections. No one questions the durability of Willite paving and the only complaint is on account of the slick surface. A heavy rain washes off all the oil and the pavement becomes quite the same as any other smooth surfaced road. Some were of the opinion that were an apron laid on the side where drivers of machines could run one wheel that this would greatly remedy the situation and eliminate many wrecks. Skidding off the road into the slough is a frequent occurrence with big machines, and as many as four cars off grade have been seen in one night here.
