
MAIL HERO WALKS INTO DEATH TRAP

POSTAL CONVENTION NOW IN SESSION

There is in session from October to October 15 in Washington, D. C., a convention consisting of the National Leagune of Postmasters, the National Association of Post-masters, the National Federation of Rural Mail Carriers and the Na-tional Federation of Post Office Executives. They are meeting in the assembly room of the post office de-partment and will be addressed during the convention by President Harding Postmaster General Hayes and the chairmen of the Senate and House committees on post offices and post roads

During the convention a banquet will be given to approximately 2000 delegates, which will also be at-tended by the President, his Cabinet, a committee on post offices and post roads of both House and Senate and several other Senators

and Representatives.

This convention is meeting at the special invitation of Postmaster General Hayes, and during the en-tire time will have free consultaion with all heads of various post office departments.

Under the direction of Postmaster General Hayes and through the President's orders a bureau of in-formation has been established in the post office department building, at which is given free to the pub-lic information and advice as to official communication or inter-course with any government department in Washington, and will facili tate for those, who take advantage of it a greater expediency of the business they may have in the na tion's capitol.
