

addition to supplying plant tonics has made a collection of prehistoric animal life ranking with visitors representing all lines of famous exhibits.

Remains of animals that roamed this section at a period estimated at 500,000 years ago were thrown Hills on Saturday. After examin-the specimens still are undentified. showing that new finds will be added to the collection.

Among the most precious relics found today were those picked up by S. Maus Purple, manager of the company. He treasures the relic, he says, because it belonged to an animal not yet classified so far as he knows.


The object is a tooth, perfectly preserved in the limestone formation. It has been compared with molars of the two-toed horse, the saber-toothed tiger, the giant sloth and other remains, but belongs to none of them.

Among the scientists who inspect-ed the debris after the latest blast were Dr. William A. Bryan, direc-tor of the Museum of Science and Art. Exposition Park; Dr. Gilbert E. Bailey, geologist of the Univer-sity of Southern California; Dr. S. O. Barnes, chemist, of Gardena: Dr. J. Z. Gilbert, chemist, of Gardena; Dr. George P. Clements, manager of the Chamber of Commerce Agricultural Department; Dr. L. E. Wyman, curator of the Exposition mu-seum; Prof. J. C. Gilbert, biologist and conchologist.
