GAS PIPE IS ON THE WAY VIA CANAL TO LOMITA

General Agent Thos. J. Protheroe of California Gas Co. Gives Information

(From Lomita "News Letter")

"Enough pipe to lay twenty-one miles of gas service in Lomita has been purchased, loaded on shipboard and was due to pass through the Panama Canal November 1. It is due to arrive in Los Angeles Harbor the latter part of next week. It is confidently expected that we will have 150 men at work in your city some time this month laying the pipe, thus assuring you gas service much sooner than was anticipated when last interviewed."

The above interview was given to J. A. Smith the fore part of the week by T. J. Protheroe, general agent of the Southern California Gas Company, the Midway Gas Company and the Producers Gas and Fuel Company, with offices in Los Angeles.

Some unknown influence evidently had been brought to bear to speed the work up for such an expenditure and outlay of new territory in a section where the present population does not warrant the magnitude of the work ought to add increased confidence to those who have invested their money here.

The gas mains will be connected onto in Torrance in the neighborhood of the gum grove on Arlington street and laid north to Narbonne avenue, where a four-inch pipe line will be laid the entire length of the street. Smaller pipe will be connected here for sections on either side of the street, and work will be rushed to make connections as fast as possible.
