PIONEER RESIDENT OF  
LOMITA IS KILLED IN  
STREET ACCIDENT

## Funeral Cortege of Mrs. M. C. Doane Largest Ever Seen In This Community

Funeral services for Mrs. M. C. Doane of Lomita, who was accidentally killed here last Saturday afternoon when she was struck by one of the Redondo-San Pedro Stages as she stepped from between two automobiles in front of the passing bus, directly in front of the "News Letter" office, were held on Tuesday afternoon, November 8, 1921, in the Lomita church.

Because of the nature of the accident which caused Mrs. Doane's death, and her wide acquaintance here, the largest attendance ever recorded at a funeral in this city was present, the church not being large enough to accommodate more than half of those who came to pay their last sad rites to their dear friend.

Mary Rebecca Stahl was born in Sterling, Jackson County, Iowa, November 25, 1851. She was married to Matthew Clarke Doane of Elgin, Iowa, March 31, 1868. Four children were born to this union, Wallace B., Lura M., Frederick F. and Daisy M., all of whom are living except Wallace, who died in infancy. Early in life she became a Christian, uniting with the United Brethren Church. She passed away November 5, 1921, within twenty days of her seventieth birthday.

Her funeral was held in the Lomita church Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. E. E. Clark, pastor of the church, officiating, assisted by Rev. W. R. Potter of the Pentecostal church of Long Beach, with which church Mrs. Doane was affiliated. Both ministers paid a just and worthy tribute to Mrs. Doane's life and Christian service. The choir of the church sang appropriate hymns. Mrs. Willacy was heard in the solo, "Not Goodbye, But Good Night." Mr. A. J. Stinton sang the verses of "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere," the choir joining in the refrain. The music was impressive and beautiful.

A large congregation filled the church to overflowing and a wealth of floral tributes showed the love and esteem in which Mrs. Doane was held. Interment was in Inglewood Cemetery.

## GAS COMPANY GRANTED PERMIT TO LAY PIPE

The permit carrying the official seal of the Los Angeles County Road Department granting permission to the Southern California Gas Company to lay 16.06 miles of gas pipe in Lomita arrived here this morning and is being held by Mr. G. W. Towne, road supervisor of this district. Accompanying the permit is a blueprint of the streets where the pipe line will be laid and shows mile after mile of pipe line that will enable hundreds of residents here to receive gas in their homes for heat and cooking. The main line will come down Narbonne avenue, and will connect with the Torrance mains on the north. This line will be of 4-inch dimension and small feeders will be run to this main. The streets served are as follows, running east and west:

Redondo and Wilmington Blvd., Miller street, Olive, Pomele, Lemon, Almond, Arizona, Rose, Poppy, Weston, Flower, Chestnut, Beacon, Cherry, Elgin, Pine, Acacia, Palm, Pepper, Fir, Long Beach-Redondo Road and other extensions cut through where street end with dead ends. North and South as follows: Pennsylvania, Cypress, Narbonne, Oak, Eshleman and Boulevard, with extensions to carry out lines where it will prove effective.
