### NEIGHBORS

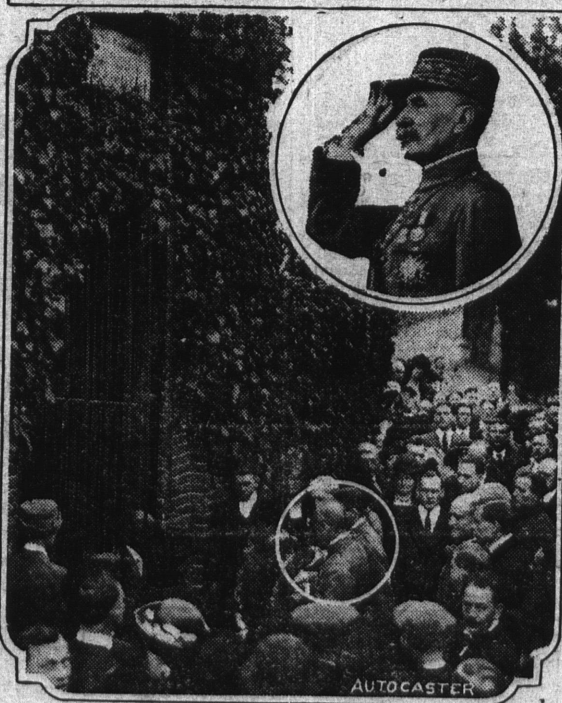
Whe na feller loves his neighbor, like the ten
