The Voice Of the People

Editor: Bruno Lessing, one of the staff writers of the Hearst papers, who writes under the heading of "Something to Think About," published a recent article on the subject of "Preachers and Politics," in which he takes the ground that preachers should steer clear of politics. Like most questions, this has two sides. What do we mean by the word politics? Whatever else we may think it means, it implies governmental policies, policies that vitally concern us all. Preachers will tell you that all good laws are based on Christian principles, and that the nearer our form of government corresponds with God's law, the more peaceful and prosperous will be the nation. "Righteousness exalteth a nation. Sin is a reproach. Wisdom's ways are ways of pleasantness and all her paths are peace."

We say all good citizens should take an interest in their government. Does the ministerial profession give a man the right to shirk his duty as a citizen? Is it not more incumbent on the men who are given the time to study the divine will to counsel and advise and point the way to higher ideals and to try to bring about the condition for which he daily prays, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven"? Wherever the battle rages of good against evil, of justice against injustice, there should we expect to find the preacher in the thick of the fray. Practically all questions of public policy are moral questions. A child's right to be well born, to have an education and a happy normal life, are all bound up in politics. Chattel slavery was a political question, and we honor the preachers who battled to overthrow human slavery. Slaves cannot be punished, prison systems cannot be improved, without going into politics. It should be the aim of

government to make it easy to do right and hard to do wrong. If preachers are not concerned in those questions, then so much the worse for the preacher. If Christianity is not preached it is nothing, and if it is not a preacher's business to seek to make a practical application of Christian principles here and now, pray what is his business? They will not make much headway in preparing the people for a better world unless they seek more heavenly conditions for this world.

The suggestion of the sentiment, "Keep the preachers out of politics," could well be attributed to His Satanic Majesty by those who believe in a personal devil. We are our brother's keeper, whether we will it or not. We make our government what it is, and with the men who have the high calling of ministers of the gospel rests the greater responsibility for that government, for they are supposed to mold public thought and to hold up to the people the high moral standards of justice and righteousness.

Environment largely makes character, and government has more to do with environment than any other human agency, for it is the reflection of public sentiment and public morals.
