WOMAN'S CLUB NOTES

Forty members of the Torrance Woman's club heard Rosemonde Rae Wright when she revealed the tortures and terrible cruelty practiced upon the trained animals of the stage and screen of today, at the last club meeting, held Monday, Nov. 13, at 2:30 p.m.

Having been with the American Animal Defense league for ten years, Mrs. Wright was able to speak with authority. Being a policewoman in the Los Angeles city jail, she said that from her experience in that capacity there was no doubt in her mind that the cruelty and crime depicted on the screen was largely responsible for the crime and delinquency of the juveniles. The speaker quoted Thomas A. Edison in his claim that the motion picture industry holds in its hands the molding of the nation.

"Conserve the animals who are dependent upon our mercy," was her plea. "Can we afford to purchase pleasure at the expense of the torture of God's helpless creatures?"

"The dog who took part in 'The Call of the Wild' was so cruelly treated during the filming of that picture that he died shortly after its completion.

"Strongheart," the wonderful dog actor, is a brilliant example of what kindness will do in training animals. Mary, the chimpanzee of Selig's zoo, and Charles Grey's lions are other examples in training through love and kindness.

"Most animals shown on the vaudeville stage travel many weary miles in cages entirely too small for them to lie down or stand in with comfort, and that is not all—they often endure starvation and suffer with thirst while en route from one place to another."

Notes Gleaned While the Oil Editor Bumps Around Proven Territory

Saturday Standard will drill out cement in Dominguez No. 1, the important wildcat on Ocean avenue east of Torrance. If the water has been successfully shut off the well will be drilled ahead into what cores showed to be an excellent formation.

A tough job of fishing is holding up progress on Standard's deep test well—Folger No. 1. The fish is at 5063 feet. Owing to the smallness of the hole considerable difficulty is being encountered.

After weeks of trouble Gilmore believes that the water has been shut off on Leake No. 1 on Carson street.

The T. J. Cannon Drilling company is getting along like wild-fire with Julian's well in East Lomita. The hole has been drilled to 2300 feet in two weeks.

Sentinel ran in water string on Joughlin No. 1, on East Old Redondo road, this week. This well shares the spotlight with Julian's and Standard's eastern extension wildcats.

Hub may skid the rig on Frye No. 1 in the Carson street area. The well is pumping about 125 barrels a day—half of which is water.

Chanlor-Canfield's Torrance No. 11, just about ready to enter the list as a producer, sanded up. Sand is being drilled out.

The state this week O. K'd the water shutoff on Chanlor-Canfield's Torrance No. 11, on 11th street.

The Santa Fe has a nice flock of wells about ready to send crude oil into the tanks. Torrance No. 13 is preparing to run oil string. The well was drilled to 3725 feet. Down 3715 feet, Torrance No. 15 is ready to run string. Both these wells are on the old Redondo road.

Torrance No. 23, of the C-C. M. O. is down 1500 feet, where casing is being set.

The Santa Fe's offset to the North American well at Plaza del Amo and Arlington avenue is down 3200 feet, while the North American well is standing in cement.

Southern California Drilling company this week cemented off Perham No. 1 on the Perham lease at Pepper and Narbonne, Lomita.

Hub's Cook-Brandon No. 1 is standing in cement.

It took the Petroleum Securities about three weeks to land the fish at 3500 feet in its Torrance No. 4 on the Marble lease. The fish was hooked this week and the well is now standing in cement at 3540 feet.

U. S. Royalties is getting down with its No. 2 and No. 3 wells near the intersection of Carson and Ivy streets. No. 2 is down 2480 feet. No. 3 is down 1600 feet.

Pan American's Lomita No. 1 was momentarily expected to go on production Thursday morning. The crew was bailing at 10 o'clock.

Late Wednesday the Chanlor-Canfield Midway Oil company put Torrance No. 10, at Cedar and Carson streets, on the pump. Agitated, the well sent plenty of oil into the sump hole. The oil was without water. The company expects this well to produce about 300 barrels a day through a 1/2-inch bean.
