

LOMITA SCHOOL WINS AWARDS AT CONTESTS AT RIVERSIDE FAIR

Last week L. A. Stump, William and Henry Griffith, Allen Grant and Donald McSwain attended the stock-judging contest at the Riverside fair. With 18 schools competing, Lomita took fifth place. In individual judging William Griffith won the second place medal, and Henry Griffith won two third place medals. William being rated the third highest of all the 43 contestants. In poultry husbandry Lomita took third place in all scores of last season in the entire county. Henry Griffith winning the trip to the fair at the State Agricultural college at Davis, Calif. He left Wednesday of this week to attend the fair.

Last Friday's assembly proved very interesting and instructive. Miss Jean Bernard, co-ordinator in the part-time education in the city schools, was the principal speaker, followed by Mrs. Stanley Miller, teacher in the

part-time department in the Torrance school.

On account of the crowded condition of the Lomita and Harbor City schools, all part-time pupils from both places attend the Torrance school.

The Choral club was organized just one month ago, and has a membership of about thirty-five.
