WATER AND OIL

In the News Letter of August 21 are stated the fears and dangers of the unincorporated town of Lemita. These fears and dangers might be well put if we were siting at an altitude of a thousand or more feet above sea level, and under conditions different than what we are under the San Gabriel, Santa Ana water shed and that is the reason for our practically unlimited supply of water. The lime reef of rock, that runs along the coast line of this water shed, that holds the salt water back retains our fresh water at practically sea level, and in places where it is embodied by reef above sea level it gives an artesian flow. Now if we were sitting at an altitude of a thousand or more feet and we had a hard shell that held this water up to sixty or a hundred feet, and by breaking that shell you would release that water to flow out through an open formation at a lower depth, there would be danger of lowering the water level, but it is a well known fact that no cavities or open formation below sea level is extensive enough to make any material difference on such a water shed as we have here. And if there were, Lomita could not protest it here by incorporating about three sections of land; and as far as mixing our water with the shallow oil seepages, the Bible years ago told us the water and oil would not mix. The city of Los Angeles is spending thousands of dollars for oil to seal their reservoirs, and in many localities oil, water and gas are taken from the same hole. All that has to be done is to put it in a reservoir, and draw the water from the bottom and the oil from the top. From the best authority that I can find Lomita has nothing to fear for her water supply, as far as the oil wells are concerned.—J. ORDINANCE No. 67

An Ordinance Granting to Union Tool Company, Its Successors and Assigns, for the Term of Twenty-One Years From the First Day of October, 1923, the Franchise, Right and Privilege to Lay, Maintain and Operate Railroad Tracks Across Certain Streets in the City

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1
The Board of Trustees of the City

Section 1
The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance hereby grants to Union Tool Company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, for the term of twenty-one (21) years from the First day of October, 1923, subject to all the terms and limitations hereinafter made and expressed, the franchise, right and privilege to lay, maintain and operate railroad tracks across that certain portions of 213th Street in the City of Torrance included within the following boundary lines:

Beginning at the Southwest corner Block 114, Torrance Tract, as per map recorded in Map Book 22, pages 94 and 95, Los Angeles (County Records; thence Easterly along the southerly line of 213th Street 96 feet; thence northerly line of 213th Street 96 feet; thence easterly along said northerly line of 213th Street to its intersection with the westerly line of said Block 114; thence southwesterly along the westerly boundary line of said Block 114 to point of beginning.

The rights, privileges and permis-

Section 2

The rights, privileges and permissions herein granted to said corporation are dependent for their continuance and validity upon the performance of said corporation of all the conditions hereinafter set forth, to-wit:

1. That the construction work on said tracks shall be done so that when completed same shall conform to grades of the City of Torrance and all, approaches to such tracks and paving between the rails of such tracks shall be constructed and maintained in good repair at the exmaintained in good repair at the expense of the grantee under such franchise.

2. Said corporation shall construct suitable culverts for the passage of water at such points as may be by the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance deemed necessary on the road bed of said railroad and shall maintain the same in proper repair.

3. Said corporation shall not use the said tracks in such a manner as to hinder or delay traffic upon said street across said tracks for any longer than three (3) minutes at any one time.

The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereupon and thereafter this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
