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


Germany Bays Hugo Schmidt Dear Friends: Arrived home a week ago yester-day. Found my people all well and were welcomed by quite a number of our old home town people also. The place looks about the same as it did 16 years ago. There are about 600 inhabitants, mostly farm-ers. They live well, get good prices for their crops, but work long hours. For Americans it is easy to live here at present; we can live for almost nothing. Food and clothing is very cheap in American money. The first night we stayed in Ger-many we got two rooms at a hotel in Leipzig, two beds in each room, in the morning rolls and coffee. The whole bill for 4 of us amounted to 840 Marks (\$1.15). A glass of good beer costs 8 Marks, or a little over 1 cent; a good cigar the same price. You can get a good meal road fare is cheap, also. For German people it is differ-ent, everything is too high, as the wages don't go up with the cost of living. Work is plentiful and no unem-

winges don't go up with the cost of living. Work is plentiful and no unem-ployment to speak of. They have the s-hour day all over Germany except on the farms. I live right here in the center of Saxony's thickly settled indust-rial district.—there are factories all over—some of them work in two shifts.




