TORRANCE SCHOOL NOTES.

Torrance school opened Monday with 509 enrolled. The total last year at opening was 393.

Owing to excellent attendance at summer school, many pupils have been promoted to higher grades. Eighty-one pupils were enrolled, and the results obtained were due to the fact that the attendance was lmost perfect.

The new rooms that were added last year, only relieved the congested condition for six months, and we have been compelled to have half-day sessions, in the kinderfirst, second and third By the beginning of next week there will probably be eight half-day sessions.

The High school is crowded as One recitation period has well. been added to accomodate larger numbers.

The architect for the new building has been instructed to rush the plans as fast as possible, and it seems quite certain that the new high school will be finished by September, 1923.

The Night School will begin Monday evening, September 18. Any one interested is urged to be present, or notify Mr. Barnett, the principal, as the first meeting will be devoted to organization. Mr. Barnett has asked for teachers for the following subjects: Dressmaking, and Millinery, Mechanical Drawing, English for Foreigners, "Americanization," Spanish, Mathematics, Commercial Courses. All interested notify Mr. Barnett, at the school, at once.

Mr. Barnett says he has had many applicants for machine shop, and automobile repairing, but this course cannot be taken, owing to the crowded condition of the school, and absence of necessary equip-

Any other subjects will be taught, if a sufficient number of pupils can be obtained, as 15 pupils are required before a teacher is supplied, for any subject.


