The four hundred tons of molten glass that lies over the immense gas furnaces in the Torrance Window Glass company's establishment will be made into the finished product next week when from 100 to 250 glass blowers and their assistants begin their fabors next Sunday night at 12 o'clock.

Fires were lighted under the furnaces two wee.s ago preparatory to having the then cold glass in condition to work when the skilled artisans arrived. The latter have now reached Torrance and the first shift will soon be at work.

While the furnaces now contain but 400 tons their full capacity is nearly twice that amount and the daily drain on the molten mass is twenty-five tons.

P. O. Receipts Show iBg Gain

Showing a gain of 20.9 per cent over the same period for 1921 the records of the post office of Torrance reveal the fact that during the nine months ending September 30, 1921 the receipts were \$6347.71 and for a like period for this year. \$7676.31.
