The types of architecture has great weight in the selection of coofing materials.

The architect and home builder of today is not concerned as to the kind of roof shelter our ancestors had, as it helps but liftle in today's selection of roof covering.

The determining factor connecting the past with the present is he availability of suitable materials.

ials.

Southern California is well supplied with material at reasonable cost suitable for roofs, the most common being shingles, tile, slate, composition and asbestos shingles. In the past the shingle has been the most widely used on account of the cost and availability, the western red cedar of the Pacific Northwest producing about 80 per cent of the shingles used.

White cedar shingles are used on the higher class of work on account of taking light colored stain as their natural weathering

account of taking light colored stain as their natural weathering qualities.

Shingles are undoubtedly the

stain as their hautal weatering qualities.

Shingles are undoubtedly the cheapest roof covering, but on account of the fire hazard they should be treated in some manner to make them fire-resisting.

Composition roofing has a wide range of uses, being used for covering from the smallest bungalow to the skyscraper. Many pleasing effects have been had on the bungalows by using a composition roof and then covering it with crushed brick or gravel.

The owner should insist upon a good grade of composition roofing made of felt and asphalt. Roofing papers containing large quantities of wood pulp do not make a serviceable roofing material.

All composition roofs should have a dry sheet under them to prevent the asphalt from dripping through in hot weather, thereby staining the plastering.

Tile for roofing is used in practically every type of architecture from the smallest dwelling to the palatial mansion. California is very fortunate in having large clay deposits, enabling the manufacture of tiles in many shades of color ranging from light to drak red. gray, golden bronze and bluish in the unglazed, and soft tones of green in glazed tile.
