## Glass Factory Now "36 Shops"

While the Torrance glass works began operations less than three weeks ago, it is now running smoothly to almost capacity and its employees number more than two hundred.

No line of manufacture holds so closely to the other traditions speaking of the number of employees, as in ordinary commercial parlance, as the official estimate their workers by the number of "shops." The local plant now maintains 36 "shops." This way of numbering their helpers is a relic of the dim past when the glass was melted in a pot instead of an immense furnace as at the present time.

Among all classes of union labor the glassblowers union are perhaps alone, in that the trade is handed down from father to son and few if any, outsiders are admitted to the secrets of the trade. This rule is adhered to religiously except in times of great need of blowers when a select few apprentices are permitted to learn the complicated trade.

Superintendent King is delighted with the output of the plant reiterating what he said at the close of the first week's work, that the quality of the window glass being made was superior to any they had yet made, which to those who know means the equal of any manufactured in this country.
