ARE SHINGLED **ROOFS TO BE OUTLAWED?**

State Housing Act, If Passed, Will Bar Wood Shingles

An interesting little booklet re-cently issued by the executive committee of the California Lum-bermen of San Francisco contains a concise and well written article on the necessity, from their point of view, of voting "no" on the proposed Housing Act, No. 5 on the official ballot for the November elections.

Referring to the Act regarding the use of shingles for roofing purposes and the intent of the Act to prohibit their further use in California, the authors under the facetious heading "A Woodpile Wrapped Around a Nigger" quote the proposed law, as follows:

"Every wooden building hereaftter erected in every incorporated town, city or city and country, shall have the exterior walls thereof and roofs thereon constructed of the same kind of materials and in the same manner hereinbefore provided for semi-fireproof buildings.

"The roofs of every semi-fireproof buildings shall be constructed of approved incombustible materials or be well covered with in approved composition, fire-resistive or fire-retardent material."

Unquestionably, says—the writer, the effect of these two provisions, if they become law, will be to prohibit the use of shingles for roofs, not merely in the congested districts of cities, but also in uncongested residence sections, suburbs, towns and villages. There is nothing in the act which modifies in any way this blanket prohibition of what is, by common admission, one of the most efficient and durable building materials used for roofs.

California is the fourth largest user of shingles in the United States.

Most important of all, the small taxpayers and prospective home-builders do not want on the statute-books a law the effect of which would increase the already high cost of home construction and raise rents.

rents.

Lumbermen have long advocated the passage of city and state regulatory measures which would enforce higher standards of building practice and reduce the fire hazard. This is a different matter, however, from a blanket law which applies equally to congested and uncongested districts, an which picks out for unjust discrimination a type of roofing material which, as the records plainly show, is a very minor factor in the cause of fires.

Anti-shingle legislation operates as a special tax on the small homebuilder, who naturally wants a shingle roof on his home because it is the most attractive and the most durable roof he can get for a reasonable price. The number and variety of substitute roofings that have recently come on the market are endless. But unless the homebuilder pays from twice to three times the cost of a good shingle roof, he can get nothing that compares with it either in appearance or in durability.

San Francisco, Oct. 20.— Archbishop Edward J. Hanna, a member of the State Immigration and Housing Commission, repudiates the State Housing Act both as a commissioner and as a citizen animated by the spirit of fair play. Archbishop Hanna is opposed to the effort being made through the State Housing Act to outlaw the shingles as roofing material in California, His individual position is strictly in accord with the stand taken by the State Immigration and Housing Commission as a whole.

Through its executive officer, R. W. Kearny, the State Immigration and Housing Commission has gone ton record as planning a new housing law wherein the ban on shingles will be removed. Paul Scharferburg, secretary of the State Immigration and Housing Commission, has written a report exposing the harmful features of the State Housing Act and urging its defeat.

The introduction of the antishingle provision into the State Housing Act has resulted in the State Immigration and Housing it Commission, and its members individually, notably Archbishop Hanna, repudiating and denouncing the law under which they were asked to conduce their official functions. This is a strange situation, but it serves to emphasize the fact that the anti-shingle provision was slipped into the State Housing Act entirely without their knowledge.

"I am now familiar," says Archbishop Hanna, "with the provision of the State Housing Act entirely without their knowledge.

porated town or incorporated city and county in California.

"Of course, I was not familiar with the provision when the State Housing Act was passed by the last Legislature and signed by Governor Stephens. Had I known about it at the time, I should have repudiated it both as a member of the State Immigration and Housing Commission and as a citizen.

"The shingle industry is one of the greatest industries of California, and I protest against the intent to destroy it.

"Every community in California, and I protest against the hazard of fire. This attempted abolition of the shingle was not necessary as antifire precaution.

"The State Immigration and Housing Commission, of which I am a member, has already gone on record in this matter, and I am glad to make it clear that my position is quite in accord with that of the State Immigration and Housing Commission as a whole."

When the anti-shingle joker was discovered in the roofing provision of the State Housing Act, the lumbermen of California held the law up by referendum. This referendum must be decided at the general election in November. It will be No. 5 on the ballot.

"I would advise every person to vote no on the State Housing Act referendum," Archishop Hannaconcluded, "and save the shingle industry of California."

Aqueduct Again **Supplies Power**

Damages being repaired, the aqueduct is again furnishing sufficient water to supply its power plants, after having been greatly reduced in capacity for about forty days. The first break in the aqueduct occurred between the Haiwee reservoir and the Fairmont reservoir on August 19, at which time water from the closed conduit system broke out. The second, due to a cloudburst, clogged the open ditch above the Haiwee reservoir completely cutting off the supply from Owens River. This impaired the generating capacity of the city plants in the San Francisquito Canyon, as there was not sufficient water to drive them to their normal capacity.

The contract between the city and the Southern Caifornia Edison Company made it possible to turn this load over to the Edison company to furnish from its steam plants. This saved the lighting situation on the streets, business houses and residences of Los Angeles, which would have otherwise been in partial or total darkness, and kept factories going and the wheels of industry turning:

It is estimated that the two breaks caused a loss of about one-twelfth of the annual electric output of the city's aqueduct power plants.—Los Angeles Times, 10-4-22
