His flowers are exhibited all over Southern California and everyone of the hundreds of varieties are very rare. People come from far and wide, during the blooming season and visit the canvas covered acreage. Mr. Bowers has sale for all of his thousands of blooms at 25 cents each.

The purpose of the Exhibit will be to sell plants, which will be delivered in the spring, each one rooted and in individual pots, and approximately a foot high ready for setting out.
