IS CHAINED TO FLAG POLE IN ELECTION BET

McManus Bets on Loser And Settles With W. T. Klusman

Answering a public announcement made several days ago by W. T. Klusman that he would enforce the terms of an election bet made with his fellow employee, Harry McManus, the terms of which were that the loser was to be paraded about the street wearing a pair of handcuffs and later chained for two hours to the city's flagpole, an immense crowd of Torrance residents Monday night congregated at the public square and enjoyed the discomfiture of McManus and the elation of Klusman.

The former had unfortunately wagered that Woolwine would occupy the gubernatorial chair January first, and when the returns were in and he discovered that his favorite lacked something like 150,000 votes willingly paid his bet.

Preceded by the loser, who wore a great dog collar about his neck to which was attached a long chain and bearing a placard, "I Voted for Woolwine and Beer," Klusman, respondent in a silk hat he had won on a similar bet and garbed in a dress suit that he later acknowledged was not his own, was wheeled in a wheelbarrow down Cabrillo street, accompanied by the shouts and laughter of a crowd of lusty-lunged boys.

Arriving at the flagpole McManus was chained to a nearby lamp-post while his captor addressed the crowd on the good work the Building and Loan company was doing for Torrance, the rejuvenation of the Chamber of Commerce, and other civic subjects, including the speaker's ambition to become a director of the Chamber of Commerce at the next election.

"Foolishness, such as this gathering represents," said Klusman, "often results in great good for a community, for it brings us together where we can discuss the really vital affairs of the community among these being the recently inaugurated Building and Loan Association and the Chamber of Commerce."

Devoting several minutes discussion to the former, during which time he urged the joining of every wage earner in Torrance and the depositing of their savings in the association's treasury, the speaker turned his attention to the Chamber of Commerce, and the great factor in civic life it represented.

"No community can be wholly successful or prosperous unless its chamber of commerce is alive. Our own chamber," he said, "is going through a period of depression not at all unusual in any community, and it only needs the united effort and cooperation of every resident of Torrance to make the chamber the success the town deserves."

"If you don't like the way things are run, spit it out," shouted the speaker. "That's the only way to make your objections felt. It is my hope that I may be on the board of directors of the Chamber to represent the plain people, of which I am one."

The two songs, "Only Me" and "Apple Blossoms," sung by Mr. McManus, were well received by the crowd.
