Flat Building To Cost \$12,000

Plans for the beautiful four-flat building that R. W. Mangum is pre-paring to erect at the corner of Liewellyn and Fourteenth streets have just been received and show one of the most unique as well as beautiful buildings of its size in the

The lots on which the structure will be erected forms a sharp-point-

will be erected forms a sharp-pointed gore, the advantages of which from an architectural point of view, have been seized by the architects and will be used with advantage in showing the beauties of the two story structure.

The front of the building, artistically adorned with stucco and ornamentad with French windows and a wide porch extending the entire width of the building, are further embellished with handsome iron grills both on the porch ends and on the upper windows.

Entering a spacious lobby, doors lead to both the right and left mats on the ground floors while a broad stairway leads to the upper apartments.

Each of the flats include a large living room eleven by sixteen feet. a dining room kitchen, bath and bedroom, while a Murphy disappearing bed with French doors, is hidden away in the living room for the uge of guests.

In the rear of the flats and across a ten-foot gravel driveway are four garages, back to back, with winding driveways leading to each set of two.

The owner of the flats and his mother will occupy the upper flat, to which has been added a sleeping porch that extends over the rear driveway and rests on the garages. One of the other flats wil be rented furnished while the remaining two will be rented unfurnished.

Work on the structure which will cost approximately \$12,000, will be pushed to early completion, the foundation being installed this week.
