Furthermore, we urge upon our governor, state board of control and representatives both in the assembly and senate the absolute safe guarding of said industrial farm for women, in Sonoma, and the appropriation of adequate funds for its continuance and development. This club also urges the appointment of a woman to the state prison board.

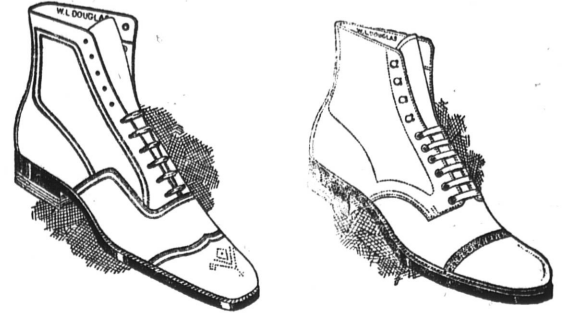
