Non-Burning Disks To Be Made Here

The Weston-Welk company of Salt Lake city, manufacturers of Economy Disks, are contemplating establishing a factory in Torrance, according to Secretary Gadeky, of the chamber of commerce, who is active in formation of a small group of men to back the industry.

The Economy Disks are a patented article, the patents being in the name of the senior member of the firm, Mr. Weston. The appliance consists of three aluminum disks of various sizes, to which are fastened calks. These disks are placed in the botton of the cooking—utensil, calks down, and prevent the burning of the food, as well as aiding the thorough cooking of the vegetable or meat. With the use of the disks it is apparently impossible to burn the food, no matter how much heat is applied to the pot or the stage of the water in the utensil.
