ORDINANCE NO. 47

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SEC-TION 2 OF AN ORDINANCE EN-VIDING FOR LICENSING AND REGULATING THE CARRYING ON OF CERTAIN PROFESSIONS TRADES, CALLINGS AND OC CUPATIONS CARRIED WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE."

The Board of Trustees of the City f Torrance do ordain as follows: SECTION I

Section 2 of an Ordinance entitled An Ordinance providing for license ng and regulating the carrying on of certain professions, trades, call-ings and occupations carried on within the limits of the City of Torrance" is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The amount of any license imposed by this Ordinance shall be deemed a debt to the City of Torrance; and any person, firm or corporation carrying on any trade, calling, profession or occu-pation mentioned in this Ordinance without having a license from said city to do so, shall be liable to an action in the name of the city in any court of competent jurisdiction for the amount of license by this Ordinance imposed on such trade, calling, profession or occupation." If the license fees provided for here in are not paid within ten (10) days after the first day of the period for which such license fee shall be paid, a penalty of fifty (50%) per cent of the fee due shall be paid by the person, firm or corpora-tion by whom such fee should have been paid, in addition to the regular amount of license fee herein provided, before any license shall be issued to such person.

SECTION 2 The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Ordinance, and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper printed and pub-lished in the City of Torrance, which is hereby designated for that purpose; and thereupon and thereafter the same shall be in full force and effect.
