NEW BUDGET RECEIVES CRITICISM Retrenchment Program Does

not Suit Politicians,

By W. E. Turner Sacramento, (Special)—California's first legislative Budget has been sub-mitted to that body by Governor Richardson. The Governor has un-questionably kept one of his campaign promises, that of reducing the ex-penses of the State below its income; penses of the state below its income; whether he has been equally fortunate in complying with his second promise; to do so without cripping any of the charitable, education or humanitarian interests of the commonwealth is a

matter of opinion. A state official said in criticism: "The Budget practically wrecks the department of education which is recognized throughout the Nation as one of the best and most economical. It is a frightful indictment of the sin-cerity of the man who promised not to impair any State educational func-tion." The Governor on his side says: tion." The Governor on his side says: "The recommendations made for the tion. schools are undoubtedly greater than they should be, but it has been my purpose to be liberal in the matter of education. Extravagance in eduof education. Extravagance in edu-cational matters has run riot during the past few years. This budget shows an increase of \$3,618,627 or 23 per cent in the past two years. Politicians in the guide of educators have squan-dered the people's money with a lavish hand and have denounced advocates of their as anomics of education.

of thrift as enemies of education. "A great political organization has been built up which has cost the people an immense sum, but has added little to the value of education given school children. The laws have been cunningly amended so that super-visors, school boards and boards of education have little control over the expenditures of school money, and hence cannot check extravagance. The people are loud in their protest as people are loud in their protest as indicated by hundreds of complaints nucleated by me, but they are unorgan-ised and unable to cope with the schemes of certain political educators. One of the features of the Budget is that it includes the expenses and revenues of the self-supporting departrevenues of the self-supporting depart-ments such as that of the Insurance Commissioner, Bank Commissioner, etc. It is proposed that the special funds enjoyed by those Commissions shall all be turned into the State Treasury, and that in many cases, as in that of the Insurance Commission where special work was done for the insurance companies that they be charged directly for the cost and made to pay themselves those engaged in to pay themselves those engaged in it without the latter looking to thu State for their fees or salary. Ac-cording to the Budget the various boards and commissions—of which the San Francisc Harbor Commission is the most important even of 25 201 the most important—expend \$7,891. 668 and their receipts reach \$10,585. 694, so that there is some \$2,694,026, to be turned into the State Treasury. It may be remarked that, evidently, be-cause those Boards or Commissions cause those boards or Commissions are self-supporting, the Governor has not included either their expenditures or receipts in his summing up of the State's receipts and expenditures. If they were included, of course the totals both for the cost of the State govern-ment and the superior model. ment, and the surplus would be larger than the figures given above. The End is Not Yet—in Economy Plan

While the Budget abolishes many offices and institutions, and reduces salaries and expenses, it is not the full extent to which the Richardson economy proposes to go, for the Governor states that the Budget had necessarily to be prepared in a hurry and "that there should be further cuts, will probably be shown on closer examinaition. However, it is safe to assume that the amount that will be given any of the various State interests will not the various State interests will not be more than the figures named in the Budget. In that matter the Leg-islature is helpless. It can not in-crease an item, though it can abolish and lower all of them, if it chooses. The Governor can strike out or lower any item that he chooses and there-fore if the Legislature raises an ap-propriation chove the figures that he has named, he has only to reduce the appropriation to whatever figure he thinks proper.

Supplementing the Budget, and evi-dently emanating from the Governor's office are a number of bills, all pro-posing to eliminate different depart-ments of the Government, either by wiping them out entirely, or else by consolidating them with some other department. There are bills too to limit the scope of the work done by institutions—as where it is proposed to bar the children of aliens from public institutions—or to reduce salar-ies, thus the Insurance Commissioner, if he continues to exist, will lose \$2,000 Supplementing the Budget, and evi-
