There are 90,000,000 acres of cutover lands in the south. Sixty percent of the standing timber of the United States is in Washington, Oregon and California. Redwood trees grow no place else in the United States and there is only one-third of the original redwood acreage is left in California. California. California contains seventeen national forests, making it the richest state in the union.

The budget has been so cut under Governor Richardson that instead of \$187,000 for forest patrol, as we had in the fast two years, there will only be \$34,000, just enough to pay the office force.
