Connelly Injured By Huge Ape

Edward Connelly, the veteran screen actor, was painfully injured at the Metro studios in Hollywood when crushed in the arms of a giant ape, "Joe Martin," during the enactment of a scene of Rex Ingram's production, "Trifling Women," to be presented at the Torrance theatre Thursday and Friday, March 29 and 30.

The actor was confined to his home in Hollywood, suffering from severe nervous shock as well as from injuries about the body and a bite in the hand.

Barbara La Marr, leading woman in the picture, was knocked aside in the course of the ape's rush for Connelly, but was uninjured.

Fatigue, resulting from 15 hours' exposure to the glare of the studio lights, is given as the explanation for the unexpected attack of the ape, who had never been known as a vicious animal.

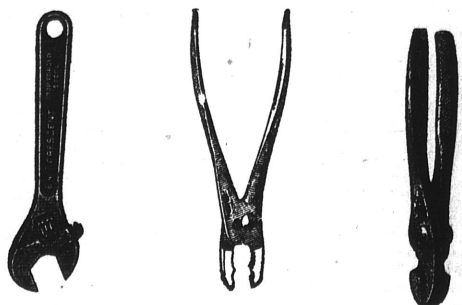
