Property Owners Sign Community Lease; Receive Offers

Yesterday the well reached a depth of 2400 feet, having passed through gas showing at 2000 feet.

Production Estimated 1,000 Barrels High Pressure

Well Brought In At 8:00 O'Clock Thursday Morning. Gravity Showing Better Than No. 2

Under a heavy gas pressure Torrance Community No. 3 on the 30-acre Standard Oil lease was brought in at 8 o'clock Thursday morning. It took the well approximately 12 hours to clean out and the production and gravity could not be determined during that period. However, the production was estimated at about 1000 barrels and the gravity is expected to be a trifle higher than that of Torrance Community No. 2 which is now about 26.

Scores of automobiles stopped at the well from the time the first head of oil shot into the sump hole until late last night.

It was the opinion of all the Standard Oil crew that the No. 3 well would prove a far better producer than Torrance Community No. 2 which is now fllowing steadily at the rate of 525

barrels a day. wells were rivaling in interest the BLDG PERMITS new producer as a result of a re-

Smith No. 1, which at the close of drilling yesterday was reported to be in a heavily saturated oil sand with every indication for a big producer. Frier No. 1 stood ready to cement at 3070 with the early oil showing said to be excellent. Smith No. 1 is expected to be put on production the first of next week.

South of Carson street and off-setting Smith No. 1, Torrance No. 5 was reported to be down 3200 feet and it was believed that it would be put on production within a few days after Smith No. 1 was brought in. One location to the west the drillers reported that the attempt to shut off the water in Torrance No. 4 had been unsuccessful and that it would be drilled deeper and re-cemented.
