Schools Torrance

Hub Oil Co. Well Smith No. 1 Comes In Wednesday

Offset Well Across Street Due to Come in at Any Moment at Depth of 3614 Feet

Giving every indication of being a 1200 or 1500-barrel well, the Hub Oil Company's Smith No. 1, six hundred feet east of the Standard's Community No. 3, put on production last week at 1100 barrels, was brought in Wednesday night under a strong gas pressure. Yesterday, while it was still cleaning out, the Hub well made around 600 and 700 barrels. It was believed, however, that it would take about 36 hours to get all the mud out of the pipe and by the end of that time it was expected to reach its maximum production.

The Hub's new well looks much better than Torrance Community No. 3 did at the start and is behaving in much the same fashion that the Standard well did. Both wells are the same depth, being brought in at 3605 feet. The gravity of the Standard well is now about 26 and is expected to increase to about 27. When the mud is cleaned out of the Hub well, the gravity will

also run about 27.

Another well that is near production is Dominguez No. 1, a half mile north of the Standard's 30-are lease. This well was spudded in about 18 months ago but encountered considerable water trouble and it was not until this week that a water shutoff was obtained. The Chanslor-Canield Midway officials are confident of getting a fair producer in this area, and are backing theis confidence by preparing to pus down Dominguez No. 2, 400 feet to the east.

The Dominguez well will extend the field much farther to the north than it was expected to go and will prove up several hundred acres to the north of the city. This is regarded by oil men to be one of the most important developments in the Torrance field during receat months. Rigs for two important wells are being completed this week on the old Redondo-Long Beach road just east of Cedar street. One of the wells is located on Lot 5, Block 393 in Tract 1952 on the Chanslor-Canfield Midway Northern Oil Company's first well in this district. Great confidence is placed in this area and many go as far as to predice that some of the best wells in the field will be drilled in the vicinity in which these wells are being put down. W. M. Keck closed another lease in the Torrance field this week, completing a deal for five lots in Block 55, north of Carson street and near the four-tenths of an acre leased to two Santa Fe Springs operators about ten days ago. It is reported that a bonus of \$2600 was paid on these lots which comprise about nine-tenths of an arce. This is believed to be a record bonts and points to higher bonuses in the near future.

Mr. Keck is one of the shrewdest independent operators in this part of the country, and the leases he has closed in the Torrance field recently show that he is checkerboarding the entire district. Judging from these tacties and the bonuses Keck is paying he is expecting the Torrance field to produce some big wells and extend over a considerable area:

If smith No. 1 reaches the 1200-barrel mark it will be the best well of the field and is now the farthest wedged solidly in the hard sand and east of the producing wells. The Hub drillers and officials are confident that this well will be all that is expected of it. The depth of oil sand is approximately 550 feet.

Just south of Carson street, and offsetting Smith No. 1, the Chanslor-Canfield Midway drillers are about borning in Torrance No. 5 at 3614 feet. The oil sand was first struck in this well at 3070 feet. It gives every indication of being a big producer. Six hundred feet to the west the crew is drilling through the cenant in Torrance No. 4, which offsets the Standard's Community No. 3, this well is expected in within the next week.
