TORRANCE PUPILS LEARN OF BEET SUGAR

Cooking Class to Aid California Beet Growers

The Southern California sugar industry is receiving hearty sup-

The Southern California sugar industry is receiving hearty support from the schools of Southern California in the educational campaign being carried on primarily for the benefit of the farmers raising beets from which Southern California sugar is made.

All students of cookery in the Torrance high school, under the supervision of Miss H. A. Coller, head of the Domestic science department in the school, will be taught this spring, in connection with the use of sugar in their work, that beet sugar can be used as well as cane for every sugar. Purpose. This will be demonstrated to the pupils in class work, and by the study of bulletins from the Agricultural Department of the University of California, where some time ago a very exacting test was made of the relative merits of beet versus cane sugar, with the result that the University certifies that they are absolutely equal for every purpose.

This support from the schools is given in the realization that the use of so much foreign produced sugar here is working a genuine hardship on the local industry, causing low prices to the farmers for beets, and a general slow-up of the industry.

It is asserted that if more of the local product could be consumed here, instead of being shipped out, the farmers would receive higher prices for their beets, and therefore raise more beets, putting the industry into full swing again, where now three of the seven huge factories are closed up, all but crippling the industry.

The education of the public to the fact that beet sugar is exactly the same as cane is the only solution of this problem.

TORRANCE TERRITORY SPREADING

(Wednesday, April 18)

Indicating that further improve-ments may be expected as the wells go east in this field, the Standard rance Community No. 3 last Thursbetween 1000 and 1100 barrels a

rance Community No. 3 last Thursday, now report that it is making between 1000 and 1100 barrels a day, although beaned down to three-eights of an inch. The first cut of the oil showed it to be 24.6 gravity. As soon as the well cleans out it is expected to test, around 27. The well was put on production at 3605 feet after passing through a little more than 500 feet of oil sand.

Torrance Community No. 3, now the biggest well in the field, is the farthest east of the producing wells and on the east edge of the thirty-acre Standard lease. On the adjoining lease the Hub Oil Company has Smith No. 1 near production and still farther east has Frier No. 1 cemented in the oil sand.

Smith No. 1 was down 3400 feet yesterday, and according to reports at the well, should go on production at 1500 or 2000 barrels. The stratum of oil sand the well is now drilling in was first struck at 3060 feet. Frier No. 1 is standing cemented in the sand at 3070 feet. Offsetting the Hub's Smith No. 1 the Chanslor-Canfield Midway Oil Company's Torrance No. 5 is drilling in the oil sand at about 3300 feet. It is expected to be put on production within the next few days. All reports from this well point to a good producer. In Torrance No. 4, one location to the west of the same lease, the third cement job proved a failure, and the well will be drilled deeper and cemented again.

A bad fishing job in the Peterson-Barker Syndicate's wildcat well held up the drill for several days recently. The well is now down 2400 feet and the log, according to officials of the company, compares favorably with the log of some of the big wells in the fields in this part of the state. This well is being followed closer than any other in the field, as it will extend the Torrance field approximately two miles if it proves to be a producer.
