TO CURTAIL PRODUCTION SURPLUS OIL

William Keck, who has several leases in the Torrance oil field and who has been active as a drillcontractor and oil producer for several years, has been selected by the Producers' Executive Comby the Producers' Executive Com-mittee of the oil producers of Southern California to pass judg-ment upon the capacity of oil wells, Mr. Keck will be assisted in this work by a corps of helpers, but he will devote all his time to the mechanical questions affecting the production of wells in South-ern California. It is the purpose of the pro-ducers' committee to curtail pro-duction owing to the surplus of oil, the phenomenal production and development of fields, and the in-

oil, the phenomenal production and development of fields, and the in-adequate storage facilities. Despite the huge additions made to stor-age, the marketing companies are incapable of handling the increased production. Co-operation of big and little producers is sought to cut production until the the market surplus now in storage can be marketed and more adequate pro-visions be made for meeting needs of the producers. The Union and the Standard are reported to have voluntarily cut their own produc-tion as much as thirty per cent in an effort to meet the emergency and co-operate with other pro-ducers. ducers.


