new fire truck and perhaps give it attention long enough to decide there is no fire in our section of town. Or if it be Monday evening when we hear the fire truck leave its temporary quarters on Cabrillo avenue, we take sufficient time from our evening paper to remark, "It's just the firemen out for practice." If the big fire truck goes booming by us on the street we admire the big red machine and possibly sigh for the days of our boyhood when the fire engine was drawn by a spectacular team of horses and it was our sole ambition to be a fireman and wear a big

tin hat when we grew up.

All these reflections are human, but do we appreciate the fact that the painter in white cap and jumper, the plumber in his shirt sleeves, the business man, and others clinging to the rail of the engine as it swings out into the street for a practice session of two or three hours, are devoting their time to this work without salary or wage? Do we properly appreciate the fact that they have done a day's work and are no doubt just as tired and desirous of rest and recreation as are

Yet these men give up their Monday evenings for fire drill, and in addition hold themselves in readiness day or night to respond to a fire call, and risk their life if need be, with no financial recompense expected.

With the occupation of the recently completed firehouse a caretaker of the fire truck will be on duty and receive a salary from the city. With this one exception, no member of the company of sixteen men receive any pay for either their attendance at drill practice or their time spent in fighting an actual fire.

The fire department of Torrance is composed of two companies of eight men each, who drill on alternate Monday evenings, under the leadership of B. F. Hannebrink.

Chief Hannebrink and several of his men have served the fire department of Torrance for several years without salary or fee. Now that, the city is incorporated and growing rapidly the time and efforts of the members of the city fire department should be appreciated sufficiently by at least being paid a fee for each actual fire attended. The men who stand between the homes of Torrance and destructive fire are entitled to some token of appreciation at the hands of the citizens. The logical source of financial recompense is through the city government, which represents all the citizens.—H. M. R.

# Passes The Half Million Mark

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
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
