# **District Leaders** United in Demand for Compton Man

Business men, professional men, editors and workmen appointed themselves a committee a few weeks ago to comb the district for the right man.

#### Choice Is Unanimous

Choice is Unanimous
After consideration of many possible candidates these men representing every community of the district chose Frank Walton of Compton with a unanimity that bespeaks success in the campaign now opening.

As soon as the candidacy of Walton was suggested throughout the district scores of leaders signified their intention of supporting him.


