## **AMERICAN LEGION GIVES TRUTH** ON JAP FARMING INTENTIONS

SAN FRANCISCO.—American Legion officials, headed by Morgan Keaten, state adjutant of the organization, are convinced that the Japanese have no intention of complying with the alien land laws of the Pacific coast states if they can evade those laws or, failing evasion, if they can force an abrogation thereof through their home government.

"The first of the plans which the Japanese organization recently announced," said Keaton, "provided for the hiring of Japanese labor, with a bonus based on net profits from the crops instead of on the gross profits. This was so clearly an attempt to evade the intent of the law that Fresno county officials declared that they would prosecute anyone taking part in such a contract."

Now there has been organized a million-dollar corporation for the Japanese, the shares in which are of \$10,000 par value each and are offered to the Japanese in the state and their American friends who desire to assist them in evading the intent and purpose of our state law, according to Keáton.
