# HARBOR CHAMBERS IN PROTEST AGAINST CEMETERY ZONE ACT

Protest was registered against the action of the city council of Los Angeles in placing the McKinley Home property, in the shoestring strip, south of Gardena, in the cemetery zone, at the regular monthly meeting of the Harbor District Chambers of Commerce at Gardena Thursday evening, Feb. 14. The attitude of the organization was contained in strong resolutions condemning the practice of alleged "wildcat" promoters of cemetery projects which have been launched in numbers recently, and was also directed to the board of county supervisors concerning the location of the new Lawndale cemetery on the Riverside boulevard four miles east of Hermosa Beach.

It was alleged by J. S. Crandall, who presented the resolution on behalf of Gardena, and also Attoney Frank R. Carroll, that these cemetery projects have been launched as investment schemes, following the deciline in interest in oil stock promotion. 
