SAN FRANCISCO.—Do you own or control one or more of the state's valuable mineral deposits? If you are included in this for-tunate (?) class, an opportunity may soon be presented to shift title to a

new owner.

According to the official records of Lloyd L. Root, state mineralogist, the wise and wealthy men of the east have directed their attention to California and are preparing to journey west for the purpose of acquiring possession of the hidden wealth of this vast empire on the shores of the During the past year a total of

During the past year a total of seven thousand inquiries have poured into the office of the California state mining bureau, a fair proportion con-sisting of detailed requests for in-formation from easterners who are preparing to extend their activities

preparing to extend their activities here.

The financiers, while interested in the production of petroleum, are more especially attracted to the mineral substances used in structural materials, industrials, salines, and fuels. "Tremendous interest has been developed in the production of cement," said Root. "The demand for this product is growing by leaps and bounds on account of the increase in construction. Any person possessing clay deposits will find ready purchasers in the near future. Brick and tile are growing in demand yearly, as are miscellaneous stones. "Recently we have had numerous requests for information regarding ron deposits. Our annual production at present is but 4000 tons, but our pre deposits are so vast that there is practically no limit to the possible production, provided the experiments low being conducted for the manufacture of pigs come up to expectation.
